

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
























Open Door Library: App Moodboard

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Open Door Library: App Icon

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
The app carries the symbolism of the message, which is to: "Open the doors to renciliation through storytelling"

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
Categorization:

This app is catered to students in elementary school, and each library has reading materials according to the literacy level of each grade.

British Columbia has the most aboriginal languages, and therefore it will be difficult to incorporate all in the early stages development.



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Door Symbolism:

To continue the symbolism of the door, I have incorporated items that is associated with the door.

Left: The Keyhole


Middle: A key opening the key hole when the user taps the story to read it.


Right: The "Read Now!" button is a door handle, and when pressed, the screen transaction is similar to when a door opens.

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App Features:

Top left: The bolded text can be clicked to open the definition.

Bottom left: Stories in an aboriginal language will have the English translation below.

Top right: The featured aboriginal languages are all native to British Columbia, which this app will be primarily used in the early stages of developing this app.

Bottom right: Users can press the play bautton to hear an audio recording of the passage. This is especially benefitial for the aboriginal langage readers, as pernounciations can often be difficult.

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Authors/Stories Featured:

If this app were ever to be executed for real, there must be proper conversation between the App brand and authors, tribes, etc to make sure that:

- 1. The story is allowed to be retold, because some stories that belong to a tribe may only be retold under certain conditions.
- 2. The authors and illustrators of the stories are first nations, to avoid any misinterpretation.
